

LEAST TO MOST PROMPTING

Always begin with the least amount of support, then increase the level of support progressively until the mentee can perform the task independently

Natural Cue

is when the mentee is given the initial task direction. Provide wait time to see if your mentee can do what is asked independently.

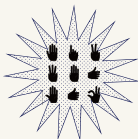

Gestural / Visual Prompt

- Gestural prompting can be a point, hand gesture, or head nod to encourage participation.
- Visual prompting can be a video, photo, list, or picture symbol used to increase a correct response.
- Often these prompts are combined.

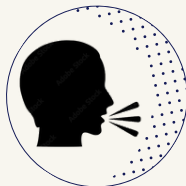

Verbal Prompts

are used to provide a hint about the next step, remind the mentee to move on to the next step, or to explicitly tell the mentee exactly what to do.

Modeling

is used to show the mentee what to do by demonstrating part or all of the task. Always model first and then ask your mentee to imitate (copy you).
